The evening went very well, with our guests Frankston Mayor Nathan Conroy and his wife Steffi, Rotary District 9820 Governor Paul Mee and his wife Adele, District Gov Elect Linda Humphries and her husband Mark, and incoming Assistant Governor Nepean Cluster Nigel Cousins and Ann. My guests were Anita (of course) and youngest daughter Alison, along with friends Brian, Lee and Joe.

I've been a member of the Rotary Club of Frankston since 2015 and have enjoyed my time with my new family – all of you, our members, and partners. My biggest regret about Rotary is that I didn't join ten years earlier – that's David Lee's fault, because he didn't invite me to join a decade earlier!

The Rotary International President for 2023-24 is Gordon McNally, a member of the Rotary Club of South Queensferry in Scotland. At the Rotary International Assembly in Florida in January this year he announced the presidential theme for 2023-24 - *Create Hope in the World*. Gordon McNally urged Rotary members to promote peace in troubled nations, help those affected by conflict, and maintain the momentum of initiatives begun by past leaders. He stated, "The goal is to restore hope — to help the world heal from destructive conflicts and, in turn, to help us achieve lasting change for ourselves."

On announcing the Rotary theme, Gordon spoke about meeting a woman in Ban Taling Chan, in Thailand. Rotary members had helped build houses, a meeting hall, childcare and health care facilities following the tsunami that devastated South Asia in late 2004. The woman had lost her husband, her daughter, and her son in the tsunami, as well as her livelihood. But she still had a gift to offer Gordon: a beautiful seashell. He said she went on to tell him that Rotary had restored her optimism – we gave her hope. This is how Rotary brings lasting change to the world – one restored or newly created hope at a time.

My hope for this year is that our club will continue, and build on, the work we have undertaken in the past. This year will include:

- Our annual Golf Day in October, which resulted in a \$20,000 donation to Community Support Frankston last year, to assist in supporting local people in need.
- Our second annual Art Show (after a break of 32 years), with the Frankston SES to again be the beneficiary.
- Mornington Hospice gardens upgrade, following our full development of it several years ago.
- Collaborate with other Rotary Clubs in our cluster on two potential programs:
 - Say NO to Violence, as an awareness campaign and potential fundraising event
 - The purchase of a specialist trolley for Peninsula Health
- Continue our work and annual celebrations at the Joy of the Earth Community Gardens.
- Our annual visit to Fort Grey at Cameron Corner, to undertake volunteering in the Wild Deserts program.
- Our ongoing support for a range of Youth programs, including:
 - National Youth Science Forum
 - The Science Experience
 - Model United Nations Assembly

- Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)
- Rotary Junior Community Awards
- The Charles Coy Scholarship
- Ongoing support of Rotary International projects, such as End Polio Now.
- The continuation of harvesting of used playgrounds to provide to villages in Bougainville.
- Our social program, which provides fellowship for our Rotary family, helping our mental health along the way.

SPEECH FROM OUTGOING PRESIDENT SUZANNE CALDWELL DELIVERED AT CHANGEOVER DINNER, 15 JUNE, 2023.



Nelson Mandela once said: "Our human compassion binds us, the one to the other - not in pity or patronizingly, but as human beings who have learnt how to turn our common suffering into hope for the future."

And this is Rotary.

At the beginning of the 2022/23 year, Jennifer Jones, our Rotary International President, the first female to hold this office, asked us to "**Imagine Rotary**". She asked us to "**Imagine**, a world that deserves our best, where we get up each day knowing that we can make a difference."

At the beginning of my journey as President of the Rotary Club of Frankston, I did **Imagine** the difference we could make to our community.

Our Club members, partners, family and friends have contributed over 12,000 volunteer hours to our local and national community this year.

We started the year with a visit of 15 Club members and partners to Fort Grey in the Stuart Desert. Drs Rebecca and Reece are bringing the desert country back to health by reintroducing locally extinct mammals that had not been seen there for more than a century. More mammals have died out in Australia over the last 200 years than anywhere else in the world. Our Club is proud to support this critical work in the environment.

The Rotary Wranglers Golf Day was a great success raising \$20,000 for Community Support Frankston. It was driven by an enthusiastic Chair, Bob, and the hard working, committee with a whole Club commitment on the day. We held a very successful Golf Day Appreciation Dinner where we presented Certificates to all our sponsors and they heard from Steve, from Community Support Frankston, of the direct impact of their sponsorship dollars.

Equally, our first Art Show in over 33 years was a wonderful example of what can be done with vision and passion. Thank you to Neil and Kaye, Max and Lee Anne and all who supported the Show. Over 500 pieces of art were exhibited and with 1 in 12 patrons buying art work, we are committed to this project for many years. We were able to donate \$15,000 to the SES Frankston Unit.

I would like to thank Mayor, Councillor Nathan Conroy, and the Frankston City Council for your support throughout the year with these projects.

We donated \$10,000 to the Victorian Flood Relief appeal and \$5,000 to the Turkey and Syria earthquake appeal.

And of course, the Club has continued with its annual commitment to donate \$100 for every member to Rotary Foundation and as well as its annual donation to the End Polio Campaign.

That gives us a donation total this year in excess of \$50,000.

After 16 years, we reluctantly decided that we could not continue with the Seaford Farmers Market. We need to acknowledge all the behind scenes work of the Market Director, John, Stall holder manager, Grant and Macca who tried to source new stalls. Also, Dennis, who risked life and limb each month to put out the signs, to Luke, Dennis and Trish for managing the supplies, to all the Market and BBQ Team Leaders and all Club members who have braved sun, wind and rain to get this market up and running each month. A huge thank you to members and partners past and present, who have had a role over 16 years in managing the market and ensuring its success. We must celebrate donating over \$500,000 from the market over the last 10 years.

The Joy Street Garden gives so much to the local community which we support with two working bees during the year and our annual meeting at the Garden in February. With thanks to Lee Anne who is the Club's representative on the Garden Committee.

We have harvested two playgrounds with the intention of gathering more and shipping them to Bougainville.

We packed hampers at Christmas time for Community Support Frankston so those in need could have some Christmas cheer. We also donated a carload of goods to Fusion to assist those they work with over Christmas.

Investing in the next generation of young people remains a strong focus of our Club. The Rotary Junior Community Awards at Frankston Heights and Belvedere Park Primary Schools is introducing the next generation of young students to the concept of Service Above Self. The Scholarship programs at Frankston High School, Frankston Heights and Belvedere Park Primary Schools and the Charles Coy Memorial Scholarship at the Oakwood School are supporting disadvantaged students.

The National Youth Science Forum always provides students with amazing opportunities to explore future career options and we sponsored two students to attend. The Model United Nations Assembly provides students with access to the debating UN topics with other students, each representing a country. The Rotary Youth Leadership Award continues to offer outstanding personal and leadership training.

We have settled into our new meeting space at the Mt Eliza Bowling Club. A huge thank you to Graham for facilitating this move and to all who assist behind the bar each week and with catering, particularly Ann Henderson. To Sergeant David, thank you for keeping us in order and entertained at Club meetings. To Greg, Rob and Barry, thank you for setting up each week.

We voted "Yes" to Zone 8 Regionalisation and to contributing \$500 to the Peace Bells which were unveiled at the International Convention.

We have worked three Bunnings BBQ's which continue to be a great fundraiser for the Club. A huge thank you to Graham for his continued management of the BBQ's.

And a joint project with Frankston North Rotary, the Banksia Tree project, has resulted in the beautification of unused land in Seaford near the freeway.

Thank you to Peter who manages our Shed and all its complications from a broken freezer to poorly packed trailers and wet marquees that need to be dried. He is ably assisted by a several other members.

Geoff has ensured that we have enjoyed a very interesting guest speaker program throughout the year. And Marie has kept in touch with our sickies.

Bob keeps us all informed through the weekly edition of The Tide. And we have embraced What's App as a way of keeping in touch.

Our social program continues to bring us all together so that we can enjoy each other's company and celebrate being part of this great Club. A big thank you to the Social Committee for all the work that goes into these events including a weekend away at Bendigo and a week in Wangaratta.

District Conference and the International Convention were inspiring Rotary events. With over 14,000 Rotarians from around the world attending the Convention in Melbourne, we were reminded of the great work that Rotary International does around the world. We can be justifiable proud of the amazing work we do and celebrate that we are on the cusp of eliminating Polio from the world. This would be an amazing achievement and one that has required dedication and commitment both in terms of money and people power, including, sadly, the deaths of 65 health workers in Pakistan as they administered the polio vaccine.

At the local and international level Rotary has continued to bring about change in its seven areas of focus. We continue to be People of Action. As always, there is still so much more for us to do as members of this great organisation. We must never lose sight of what, collectively, we can and have achieved.

I would like to thank every member, partners and family and friends who have supported me and the work of this Club during the year. Your work, your words of encouragement and thoughtfulness has not gone unnoticed by me. Thank you for your commitment to each other, this Club and for doing good in the world.

A huge thank you to the Board: PE David, IPP Rob, Secretary and Assistant Treasurer Trish, Treasurer Campbell, Assistant Secretary Grant and all Directors, John, Luke, Wayne, Bill, Neil and Nellie for your tireless work throughout the year. Your support has been fantastic.

I would also like to thank all the Past Presidents who I have spoken to throughout the year as I sought your wise counsel. Thank you!

And now, in the blink of an eye, my year as President of the Rotary Club of Frankston has come to an end.

You may recall last year I quoted our Australian RI President Sir Clem Renouf. Sir Clem said:

“Rotary takes ordinary people and gives them extraordinary opportunities to do more with their lives than they had ever dreamed possible.”

This year has been an extraordinary one for me, much more than I could have ***Imagined.***

I hope that you have found the extraordinary in your Rotary journey this year and that you know that you have made a difference.

I wish President Elect David and the Board all the best for the next Rotary year.

The Paul Harris Fellow recognition acknowledges individuals who contribute, or who have contributions made in their name, of \$1,000 to [The Rotary Foundation](#).

Rotary established the [recognition](#) in 1957 to encourage and show appreciation for substantial contributions to what was then the Foundation's only program, Rotary Foundation Fellowships for Advanced Study, the precursor to Ambassadorial Scholarships.

In our Club, a Paul Harris Fellow is presented to recognise exceptional service to the Club and our community.

Paul Harris Fellows are presented on the recommendation of a committee chaired by PP Bob Tanner. The final decision rests with the President.

I am delighted to make presentations to the following Rotarians:

Secretary Trish Anderson:

Trish joined our Club ten years ago and has been a committed Rotarian ever since.

Trish has served as Secretary of this Club in 2016/17, 2017/18 and 2022/23. Trish has also held other Director roles on the Board. In addition, Trish has had the role of Assistant Treasurer for six years. She completes all the statutory requirements for the Club and supports the Treasurer in his role.

Trish has also played a key role in the running of the bbq at the Seaford Farmers Market working as Supply Officer and Shift Supervisor as well as ensuring we are meeting the compliance requirements of the Frankston City Council.

Trish was a member of the multi-Club International Women's Day Breakfast Committee for six years.

Trish is also the Secretary and Treasurer of the Community Breakfast Club run each day from Chisolm TAFE as well as again completing all compliance requirements. In recognition of Trish's outstanding contribution to the Club and to the community we present Trish with a Paul Harris Fellow.



PP Max Lane PHF:

Max took the inspiration for the Art Show and ran with it. Max connected with Gallery 247 and managed the work with them, creating the artwork and promotional material for the art show, for providing the curation of the show, and was instrumental in the overall success of the Show.

Max also was a member of the Golf Day committee, where he again created the artwork and promotional material for the Day.

Max's outstanding contribution to the work of this Club and in particular to the two major projects this year, is recognised tonight with the presentation of a Paul Harris Fellow Sapphire Pin.

**ROYCE ABBEY AWARD:**

In 1988/89 Royce Abbey, a member of the Rotary Club of Essendon, became the third Australian Rotarian to serve as President of Rotary International. Following their successful year and in recognition of Royce Abbey's leadership, the District Governors from around the world established The Royce and Jean Abbey Endowed Fund with the Rotary Foundation.

The Fund has financed almost thirty Vocational Scholarships giving farmers, teachers and community leaders from the Asia Pacific Region and beyond the opportunity to gain practical skills in Australia. Each Scholarship provides \$10,000 US for up to three months vocational training in Australia.

The Royce Abbey Award is granted by a Rotary Club to one of its members and recognises a Rotarian who demonstrates enthusiasm and commitment consistent with Royce Abbey's Presidential theme: "Put Life into Rotary, Your Life".

It is my great pleasure tonight to present the Royce Abbey Award to PP Bob Tanner PHF Sapphire Pin to recognise his outstanding contribution to Rotary and our Club.

Bob Tanner was President of the Club in 1987/88, Secretary 1983/84 and 2001/02. Bob is the "go to person" in our Club for the history of the Club and all things Rotary. He updates

our Constitution and By Laws as required and has produced the weekly Club bulletin for ten consecutive years. Bob mentors new members to the Club as well as being a mentor to all new Presidents. Bob is a very proud Rotarian who has shown his commitment and enthusiasm to Rotary and its ideals over the last 42 years.
