CLUB ASSEMBLY DISCUSSION OUTCOMES– 13 OCTOBER

1. Our meeting venue and catering arrangements – agreed that we'd remain at the Mt Eliza Bowls Club (a formal request has been sent) for next year, and that we'd seek a new caterer. A small subcommittee has met and already contacted several caterers, with one having already responded. We'll keep you informed in the coming weeks, but please be prepared for a significant rise in meal costs.
Also discussed was the heavy workload by President Suzanne and a small handful of others (including Anne H and Susan S) for our self-catering nights. It was decided to co-opt other members to assist on a rostering basis if future catering arrangements requires us to look after ourselves on occasions.
2. Running our bar – I am currently preparing a rota of our members who have Responsible Serving of Alcohol (RSA) accreditation to take on the management of the bar. Several other members have offered to attain their RSA accreditation so we can further share the responsibility. More details in the Tide next week.
3. Art Show – Neil Black provided an excellent summary of the workload to prepare for the Art Show, plus a breakdown of the program, including the set-up, official opening cocktail function, general admission, and pack-up. To date, Neil and his small team have secured prizes to the value of \$9,000 for art exhibitors. A decision was made at the Club Assembly that the primary beneficiary of the Art Show would be the Frankston SES; the Art Show committee would liaise with them to finalise details, so we can include this in our promotions.
4. Dues and membership – following a discussion, it was recommended that new members would have their first six months' of fees waived, the remaining period of the membership year they would be charged on a pro rata basis. This recommendation will be tabled and ratified at the next Board meeting, with the relevant by-law checked to ensure it remains correct.
5. Rotary Youth Exchange – following a robust discussion, the Club membership voted not to pursue reinstating the program, nor will we consider hosting Rotary Exchange students.
6. Zoom – it was decided that the majority of members can see the value of keeping our Zoom broadcasts going each week (where we have the facilities to do so), as it is a benefit to our members who may be unwell, those who are travelling; and is an important tool for our Board meetings, project planning and other potential uses.

I hope you all enjoyed the session as much as I did – we had frank and meaningful discussions, resulting in some decisions being made that were agreeable to the majority of members. Thank you all for attending and contributing, with a very satisfying number of members attending in person and on Zoom. I'd also like to acknowledge the extremely helpful information that President Suzanne provided me with beforehand, and to Grant Wishnowsky for kindly agreeing to take some notes during the evening.

On another unrelated matter, what a great day the Golf Day was! It was an absolute pleasure to work with such a cooperative group of people, in such well-organised teams, to deliver what I assume must have been a highly successful event. Both Anita and I take our hats off to the organisers who led by example, delivering such a smoothly coordinated event. It made me very proud to be a Rotarian for the small part I played in the overall event – well done all. **PE David Cross**

PROCESS FOR ELECTION OF PRESIDENT 2024/25 and TREASURER for 2023/24

Week	Date	Action
	11 October Board meeting	Board approves two of the most recent Past Presidents to serve on Nomination Committee. PP Rob Stewart PP Luke Provis
7	13 October	At the regular meeting seven weeks prior to the AGM, the Presiding Officer shall call for nominations for two candidates for the Nominating Committee. The Nominating Committee shall comprise five members, the President, two of the most recent past Presidents available, and two elected by the members of the Club. The two elected members of the Club cannot have held a Board position for the last three years, except for the Secretary and Treasurer who are eligible any time after vacating their office. Nominations shall be made by any member in writing, each nomination to be signed by the nominating members and another member of the Club, and to carry acceptance of nomination signed by the Member nominated.
6	20 October	Close nominations for Nomination Committee at the end of the regular meeting.
5	27 October	Where the nominations for the Nomination Committee exceeds two members, a ballot will be held and the two candidates securing the highest number of votes shall be declared elected. Nominating Committee to meet between week 4 and 5. A majority of the Committee shall constitute a meeting. Decisions shall be a majority vote and if voting is equal

		the Chairman must record a casting vote. Proceedings of this committee are strictly confidential. The Committee shall select a Nominee for the office of President (2024/25) and office of Treasurer (2023/24).
<u>4</u>	3 November	Notwithstanding any nominations made by the Nominating Committee any members of the Club may select a nominee for election as President or Treasurer. Such nominations must be made in writing signed by the nominator and another member of the Club and carry an acceptance of nomination signed by the member nominated. The time which such nominations may be made will expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting two weeks prior to the AGM. Those nominations, together with those of the Nominating Committee, shall be placed on a Ballot at the AGM and the candidates receiving a majority of votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices.
<u>3</u>	10 November	The recommendations of the Nominating Committee for shall be reported to members of the Club at the regular meeting of the Club three weeks prior to the AGM. At a regular meeting 3 weeks prior to the AGM, nominations shall be called for by the Presiding Officer for candidates for the Board of Directors. Nominations may be made by any member in writing, each nomination to be signed by the nominating member, and another member of the Club, and to carry acceptance of nomination signed by member nominated. The time during which such nominations may be made will expire at the conclusion of the regular meeting one week before the AGM.
<u>2</u>	17 November	The acceptance of any additional nominations for the position of President or Treasurer from Club members will expire at the conclusion of the of the regular meeting two weeks prior to AGM.
<u>1</u>	24 November	Nominations for the Board of Directors close.
<u>0</u>	1 December	AGM If any additional nominations are received for the positions of President (2024/25) or Treasurer (2023/24) than those nominations together with the those of the Nominating Committee, shall be placed on a ballot at the AGM and the candidates receiving the majority of votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. If no additional nominations are forthcoming the Presiding Officer at the AGM shall accept the nominations from the Nominating Committee and shall declare elected as President and Treasurer the nominees of the Committee. Nominations for the position of Board of Directors, where they exceed the number of positions needed, shall be placed on a Ballot and voted for at the AGM.

Back in Ages Past



- 1873 the Seaford Foreshore Reserve was formed
- Melbourne's largest Banksia Integrifolia colony
- 7 km long but quite narrow, a walking track runs inside it

Nepean Highway Seaford



- Seaford Foreshore Reserve Looking North West towards Melbourne

Ancient Grey Sand Dunes make up the area beneath my home.

A block cleared nearby looks like this:

- Width of old dune is approx. 50M
- Height above G/L is about 4-6M,
- Water table is about -2M,
- PH is a nice 6.5 excellent for W.A. Banksias.



Before we started planting out April 2015



In the beginning... 2015-16



- Started out with four 6" banksias, prinites, marginata, speciosa and menziesii in one bed at the rear, in this pic they are about 9 Months old.

Now I became too interested in taking pic's of baby B's so...

- Created a table of all Baby Banksia pictures as a reference source for everyone everywhere...
- ✓ Available on the Banksia Lovers Facebook pages
- ✓ The Study Group itself
- Although its still not completed, I update it from time to time.



Getting rarer B's became an issue, so seeds were grown



When I saw this Pic on Banksia Lovers pages I got an idea!



What if I could do this sort of Banksia display garden here?



Around the corner from Home on Seaford Rd Seaford Vic?

- Wrote to VicRoads... 1 year later we have a permit to plant out 2HA of land on two lots at the intersection of Seaford & Wells Roads Seaford.
- First up we have to produce and submit a planting plan.
- That's where all your members could lend a hand?

The challenges of our 2 lots



- Whilst these two lots are not as sandy as where I live, it's still predominately sandy but can be waterlogged on occasions in the two trenched areas marked on the following site plans.

About the 2 lots



PH & Sample testing:
A necessary part of successfully growing Banksias – preparatory planning

The Sites – made up of 2 lots:

- **Lot 1:**
 - The eastern block, abuts a freeway overpass, it has ramparts up to 12M high, fading away almost to ground level at its ends and in some ways could be thought of as "bowl shaped".
 - its land area is around 2 HA. A drainage trench runs from about the center of this lot westwards under Wells Rd into Lot 2.
- **Lot 2:**
 - Long sliver of land that at its Eastern end is about 30M wide & its Western end tapers down to a narrow strip of about 3M x 180M long.
 - A fair fall towards owners back fences and a drainage trench, Lot 2's Land Area is around 3,500 Sq M.

NEXT: VicRoads Require a Planting Plan

We're asking any interested persons to make such suggestions using Banksias naturally.

Current thinking:

- **Lot 1:** Its 12m ramparts up to the freeways exit gives good drainage on its banks and recent testing shows that these ramparts hold moist soils. Giving vehicles clear lines of site has to be priority number one.
- **Lot 2:** Plant out species at about a 45 degree lines to the adjacent roadway in an easterly direction, with spacings to allow council grass mowing, with around 2-2.5m gaps. This will give each row some exposure to the north for maximum sunshine for flowering.
